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DÍA DE LOS MUERTOS ALTAR

<u>Set up:</u>

- Find a space for your altar
- Encourage everyone to participate, and remember that all feelings are part of a healthy emotional experience

Suggested Guidelines

- Talking about the activity:
 - Explain what Day of the Dead is
 - Talk about making an altar to honor your person that died
 - Collaborate on what you'd like to include to honor that person
 - Find others ways to honor that person (eating their favorite food, sharing memories)

<u>Activity:</u>

- Find a place in your home for an altar
- Decorate your altar with traditional altar components
 - Typically three-tiered
 - Marigolds
 - Papel picado
 - Candles
 - Monarch butterflies
 - Sugar skulls (made or bought)
- Now, add photos of your loved ones
 - Add items as a family or individually
 - Items the person loved or enjoyed
 - Food or drink they enjoyed
- Find time to reflect as a family. Keep your altar up as long as you like. Día de los Muertos takes place November 1 and 2
